Littlefoot The Land Before Time Littlefoot is the main character in The Land Before Time, a beloved animated film series and franchise created by Universal Pictures and Amblin Entertainment.

About Littlefoot:

- Species: Apatosaurus (often referred to as a "Longneck" in the films)

- Singing Dinosaurs: Starting with Journey to the Big Water, every sequel had musical numbers.
